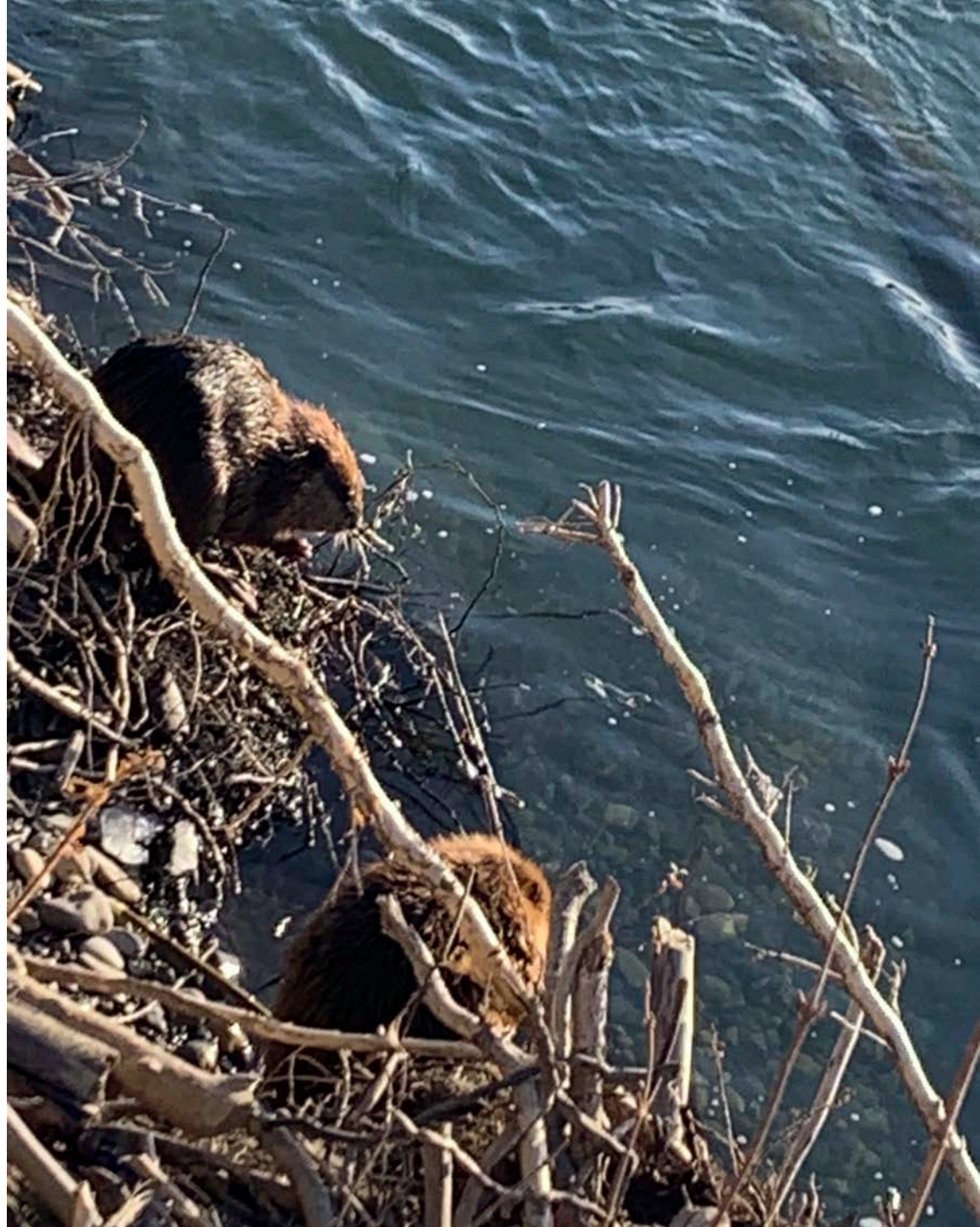

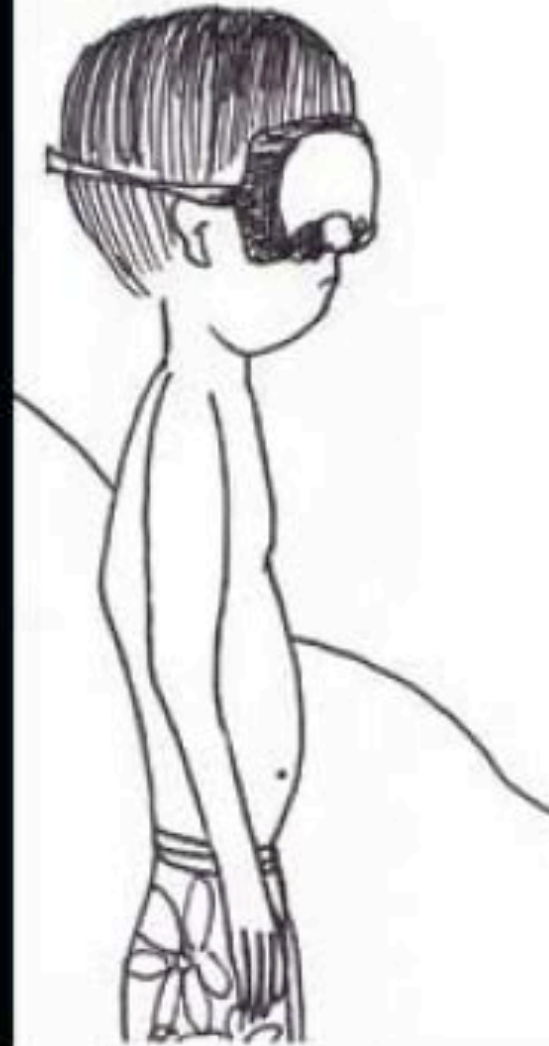




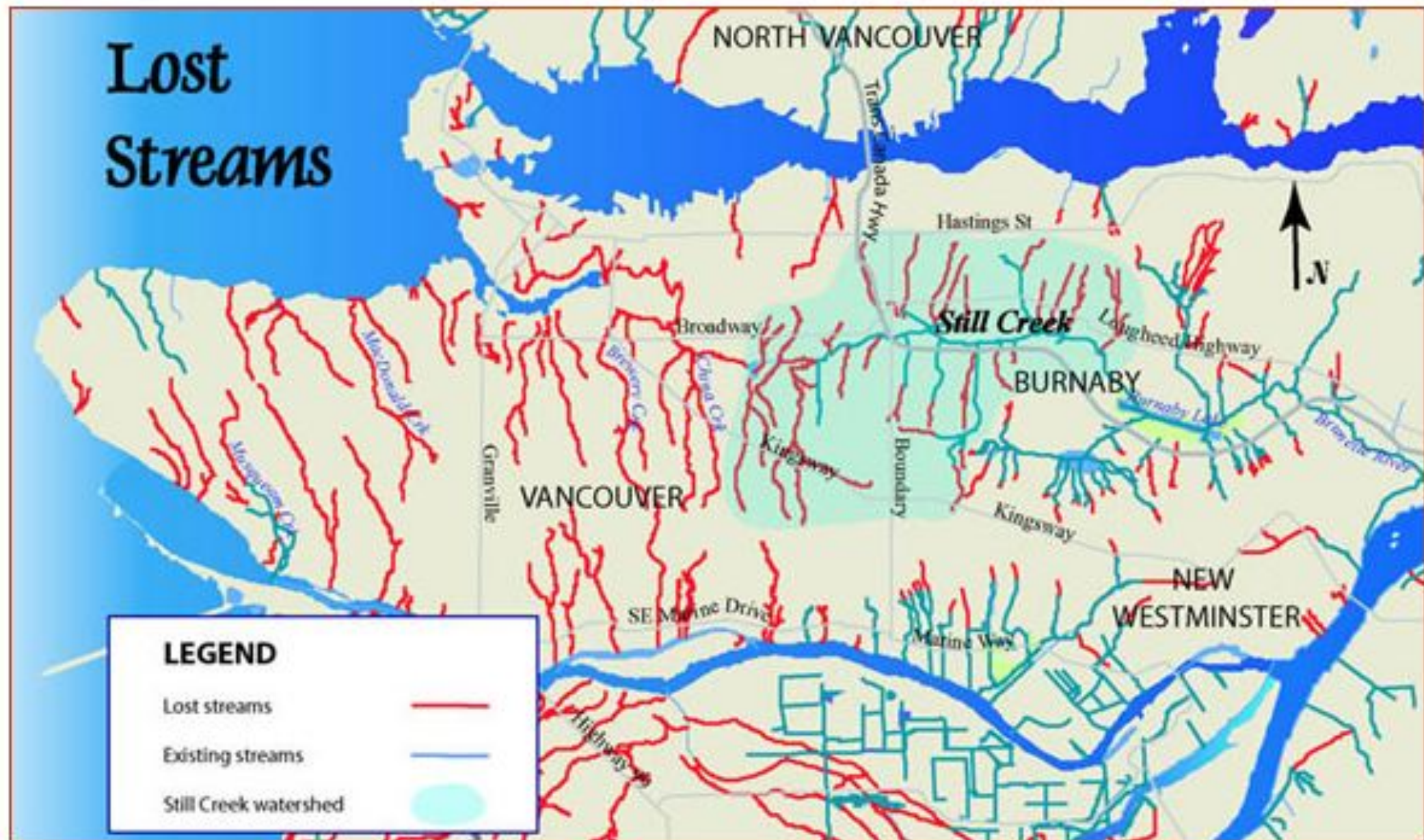




① Imagine the spaces in ②
