What's in a name?

Did you know that the North Saskatchewan River's name comes from the Cree word *kisis-ska-tche-wan* meaning "swift current"? They called the NSR *Kisiskâciwani-sîpiy, or* "swift-flowing river." It was first documented as the Saskatchiwine River in 1793 by Alexander Mackenzie.

Riparian Planning Workshops & Webinar







Over the summer, NSWA partnered with Municipal Planning Services to deliver two Riparian Policy Workshops as part of our *Riparian Health Action Plan*. We brought municipal staff together to discuss challenges and solutions for better riparian planning guidelines and bylaw implementation.


Feedback from these workshops is helping inform our upcoming *Riparian Policy Best Management Guide*, an exciting tool to help planners better align new development with riparian health. This will all be further discussed during our upcoming webinar!

On October 6th, **Jane Dauphinee** and **James Haney** from **Municipal Planning Services** will discuss the important role local governments play in stewarding riparian areas through land use and development planning. The speakers will share what has been learned in over thirty years of professional experience in land use policy and regulation with urban and rural municipalities across the watershed, highlighting successes and gaps in best practice.

Environmental DNA Monitoring







NSWA staff went out on an Environmental DNA (eDNA) sampling trip in September!

We ventured out to the watershed's headwaters, including the Nordegg River, Brazeau Reservoir, Strawberry Creek, and the NSR's mainstem near Drayton Valley. eDNA monitoring provides an exciting opportunity to efficiently gather data, producing a comprehensive and holistic picture of the species present in a water body. More sampling trips are planned, and ultimately, our efforts will provide information about invasive species presence and general biodiversity throughout the entire watershed. DROUGHT INFORMATION

Alberta experienced a very hot and dry summer this year. The <u>Canadian Drought Outlook</u> noted abnormally dry to extreme drought conditions throughout southern Alberta, and looking ahead, Environment and Climate Change Canada's long-range forecast projects a greater likelihood that <u>El Nino conditions</u> will persist with above-average temperatures and below-normal precipitation this winter. **Alberta's government will be monitoring the**

situation throughout the Fall and is working closely with water users and local governments to help manage and conserve water, where possible.








The Inconvenient Indian, Thomas King
