

TRUTH and RECONCILIATION



I invite you to join me and my NSWA Board and colleagues in acknowledging the intergenerational harm caused by residential schools, and I call upon and encourage everyone to wear orange to honour the experiences of children who were stolen from their families and placed in Indian Residential Schools - those who did not return home, those who survived, their families, and their communities. The legacy of Indigenous Residential Schools, Indian Day Schools, the Sixties Scoop, and many other aspects of colonialism continue to impact Indigenous peoples today.

I invite you to take part in any of the many ways of learning of the harms of residential schools and the path of reconciliation that are available here in the Edmonton area and across the province.

I invite you to <u>read or re-read the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions of Canada's 94 Calls to</u> <u>Action</u> (no excuses - it's only 10 pages and every Canadian should be familiar with what it says!), and to select one that you will personally action.

I invite you to find your own ways of acknowledging, reflecting, learning, and doing.

The NSWA recognizes the role of watershed management practitioners in perpetuating colonial systems through the exclusive use of western science and engagement systems. We are committed to decolonizing these systems and working to co-create space for full and meaningful inclusion of Indigenous Peoples, Indigenous Science, and Indigenous knowledge systems. We make this statement as an affirmation that we are committed to improving the practice of watershed stewardship for everyone in the North Saskatchewan watershed and beyond.

MAKING CONNECTIONS









Thank you to Jill and Kaila for making connections with many people in our watershed this summer! As fall begins we take a look back at some of our **favorite summer events.**.

We were excited to join the **University of Alberta's Environmental Engineering class** on a canoe trip down the NSR through Edmonton. We stopped along a river bank along the way and talked about watersheds and water quality management with Mike Christenson from **EPCOR**. The students were very enthusiastic had a lot of great questions. It was a lovely day for a paddle.

A big thank you to the families and event organizers who came to help plant the eco-buffer at the Claude N. Brennan Memorial Trout Pond in Vermilion Provincial Park. Event volunteers planted all morning. The kids in attendance stole the show with their enthusiasm and excitement in choosing what to plant where! We planted native shrubs and trees along the pond, providing a 'buffer' against pollutants, enhancing habitat for wildlife, and providing stability against erosion. After a BBQ lunch, event partners planted a second eco-buffer at the Vermilion dog park. This project was made possible by Lakeland College, ALUS, Agroforestry and Woodlot Extension Society (AWES), Alberta Environment and Parks, Vermilion River Watershed Alliance, and the Town of Vermilion.


We recently teamed up with <u>Cows and Fish - Alberta Riparian Habitat Management Society</u>, <u>Ukrainian</u> <u>Heritage Village Museum</u> and <u>Lamont County</u> to install a beaver coexistence device at Goose Lake. This included a pond-leveler and culvert protector to mitigate damming of the culvert and further road flooding. Beavers are a valuable part of our watershed, and their dams provide a host of benefits. However, these dams are often at odds with human land-use change, leading to conflict.

NSWA is happy to support projects that look for innovative methods to ensure we can coexist with the

wildlife in our watershed!

Cory Olsen - Alberta Community Bat Program - Wetland and Riparian Area Management for Bat Conservation


