WHAT'S A RIPARIAN AREA?

Riparian areas are the green belts you see around rivers, lakes, wetlands, and streams. They are the transition areas between the aquatic (water) and terrestrial (uplands) areas, where the extra water results in moist soils supporting water-loving vegetation.

Riparian areas have many important functions - they filter and store water, recharge aquifers, provide habitat for many species and many other functions. THANK YOU, MARIJKE!



SUMMER REFLECTIONS



Atimoswe Creek feeds into the North Saskatchewan River near Elk Point, about 175 km east of Edmonton in the Frog subwatershed. It is a prairie fed creek, with flow contributions from spring

runoff and summer storms. This video includes a compilation of photographs taken from the Atimoswe Creek monitoring station from January 2021 to July 2022 and a graph of the Average Daily Flow throughout this time.

The comprehensive [WaterSHED Monitoring Program](#) encompasses 20 monitoring stations on tributaries from the headwaters of the North Saskatchewan River to the Saskatchewan border. The North Saskatchewan River is the source of drinking water for more than 65 communities (including Edmonton) in the capital region. This program improves data collection both upstream and downstream of Edmonton, allowing all partners to make informed decisions for protecting and preserving water in the North Saskatchewan River.



Are you an angler in our watershed? Take part in this survey about local fish consumption in Alberta and help provide information for a University of Alberta research project!
